INTRODUCTION

The following document is a housing guide prepared by current graduate students from the Robert H. Smith School of Business. The purpose of this guide is to assist newly admitted MBA and Business Master's students to familiarize themselves with the area and find suitable housing arrangements.

All graduate students live in off-campus housing. Apartments, townhouses, and shared houses are available for rent in Maryland, Northern Virginia, and Washington D.C.

*All areas are categorized by state/district and are not written in order of recommendation.

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GENERAL TIPS & COVID- 19 IMPLICATIONS:

Most of the housing recommendations are based off previous cohort data and assume normal market conditions. Wherever applicable updated information, tips, and recommendations were included to assist in the housing search. Please take the time to conduct your own research to ensure you have the most up to date information.

Important considerations

As many of us begin preparing for this fall there remain many questions about what that may look like and how to best prepare. With this in mind, we have three general COVID-19 specific recommendations for the 2022-2023 academic year. Begin your search as early as possible

During "normal" market conditions it took on average 1-3 months for UMD students to secure housing. Many people anticipate a much more competitive housing market for this upcoming academic year. As we get closer to the beginning of the school year, we expect that there will be far less options. With this is mind it would be best to conduct research now and find housing arrangements that would best suit your individual needs. As of March 2022, campus is planning for a fully in person Fall 2022 semester. Please monitor communications form the university for any updates or changes.

Get your documentation in order

To increase your chances of securing the best housing arrangement it is important that you are prepared. This includes gathering all the necessary documentation/ paperwork such as:

Proof of employment Photo Identification List of Past Addresses Tax Returns Banking Information Reference Letters Proof of Residence

It would also be wise to familiarize yourself with local utility, internet, cable, and other various providers in the area. The more research and preparation you do the more likely it is that you will find suitable housing and have a better overall experience. Minimize risk

In attempt to adapt to the current market conditions many landlords and management companies are offering COVID-19 addendums. Although these addendums vary in detail – the overall concept is that it provides you with additional protection to COVID-19 related impacts. In many cases addendums can legally break or shorten leases and/or significant discount your rent if your original arrangements are impacted due to COVID-19. - Look to see if your program has a Facebook, LinkedIn or Canvas group to find roommates or ask questions. Current students are monitoring it and can provide answers and suggestions.

- Prioritize what is important to you (cost, commute, social, etc.) to tailor your search.
- If you do not plan on having a car, live near public transportation. College Park is located on the Green Line (see Metro map on last page).

• You can search for housing by bedrooms, rent, location, etc.

General tips:

- Start your search early if possible. Most students found housing within 2-4 weeks of beginning their search, but some students also took 1-3 months to find housing.
- Consider commute time relative to potential class schedule (classes may begin as early as 8am) and try living within 25-30 minutes of College Park, as a long commute can be exhausting. Spoiler alert: Maryland traffic can get pretty bad at times.
- The commute via Metro can be unpredictable on the way to school if switching metro lines. (Please see Metro map on last page). Be sure to plan accordingly.
- If you can, visit the different neighborhoods and apartments to get an idea of the surroundings and commute times before deciding.
- Try to find a roommate to save money. Speak or meet with them beforehand to make sure you are compatible. Refence the article <u>'10 Conversations You Should Have With Your Roommate</u> <u>Before Moving In'</u> for tips/ advice for finding a good roommate.
- Be selective to ensure priorities align with location and property even if it means staying in temporary housing before finalizing a place → <u>AirBnb, Vrbo</u>, hotels, or even a friend's couch!
- Consider where the neighborhood is in relation to I-495/Beltway as this is one of the main highways in and around the DC area.

About the Area: College Park is home to the University of Maryland's Flagship campus and is nestled in the heart of Prince George's County. Students choose to live in College Park primarily due to the proximity to campus. Although there is no on-campus graduate housing there are plenty of other options, most of which can be easily accessed by public transportation. The major drawback to living in this area is the cost of living. College Park ranks among the most expensive towns to live in Maryland. The average commute to school by car is about 10-15 minutes meanwhile the public transportation average commute time is roughly 10-30 minutes. The most popular type of transportation for students and residents in the area is Shuttle UM – the University of Maryland's bus system maintained by the University's department of transportation. Additionally, there is a wide availability of bike shares and escooters to get around town and campus.

About the Area: Baltimore, Columbia, and Annapolis are cities in Maryland outside of the I-495/Beltway. Some students chose to live in these areas primarily due to low cost, reputation of the location, and social life. Baltimore is Maryland's largest city and economic center and constitutes the northeastern hub of Baltimore-Washington metropolitan area. Many students are attracted to the Baltimore due to endless entertainment options and professional opportunities that the city has to offer. Although students say they enjoy the area, it can be a long drive to DC and College Park (20min-60min). Columbia, which is known to be a safe residential area, serves as a midpoint between DC and Baltimore. Although Columbia is not as large as Baltimore is still boasts a population of roughly 104k residents. Annapolis is home of the U.S. Naval Academy, which also offers a variety of bars, restaurants, and many boutiques for shopping. The main drawback is the approximate 45+ minute drive to campus and distance from other classmates living closer to DC and campus.

"The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (Metro) was created by an interstate compact in 1967 to plan, develop, build, finance, and operate a balanced regional transportation system in the national capital area. Metro began building its rail system in 1969, acquired four regional bus systems in 1973, and began operating the first phase of Metrorail in 1976. Today, Metrorail serves 91 stations and has 117 miles of track. Metrobus serves the nation's capital 24 hours a day, seven days a week with 1,500 buses. Metrorail and Metrobus serve a population of approximately 4 million within a 1,500-square mile jurisdiction.
